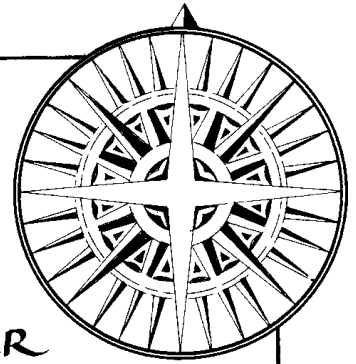

### “Giving Back to the Mountains We Love!”

May 12, 7:30pm at the Boulder Clubroom

Five years ago, CMC member Ed Self gathered 20 volunteers to plant willows to improve wetland habitat around a pond in Boulder County. From that experience grew the idea of creating a community of committed volunteers to restore natural environments damaged by human activity or natural disasters.

Wildlands Restoration Volunteers (WRV), formed as a non-profit organization to restore public lands primarily in Boulder County, now has a contact list of over 800 individuals. In April, WRV's 50th project began work on rehabilitating a section of National Forest in Left Hand Canyon that was heavily impacted by motorized recreation.

Now the director of WRV, Ed will describe the group's activities and show before-and-after slides of projects in spectacular areas like Indian Peaks Wilderness, Rocky Mountain National Park, Arapahoe-Roosevelt National Forest, and Boulder Open Space.

If you're interested in conservation in your own backyard, this program will show you what can be done and how to take part.

### Rock Leading School Applications Due May 10

The annual Rock Leading School trains prospective leaders in safe and efficient techniques of leading on rock. Participants will learn the use of natural and artificial protection, construction of various types of climbing anchors, and single-pitch and multi-pitch leading techniques. The course consists of an evening lecture session on Wednesday, June 9, and three Saturday field trips on June 12, 19, and 26.

Participants must be current CMC members, be able to follow moderately difficult rock climbs (at least 5.6), be able to attend the lecture and all field trips, and have attended basic mountaineering school or have equivalent skills. Prior rock leading experience is not necessary.

Cost is \$75, \$60 for Boulder Mountaineering School assistant instructors and rock climb co-leaders. Applications are due May 10 but the class always fills, so applying as soon as possible is recommended.

A Mountain-Oriented First Aid class will take place Saturday, May 22, from 8am - 5pm at the Boulder Clubroom.

The class is for any member who wants to become or continue as a trip leader, and is just as appropriate for anyone who simply wants to learn a little more about wilderness first aid. Plus, MOFA is less time consuming than general first aid courses. Dr. Doug Hill, who teaches for CMC Denver group, will be there to help and talk about meds.

# Council Funds Two Conservation Grants

At the last meeting, Council agreed with the recommendation of the Conservation Committee to provide conservation grants to the Colorado Fourteener Conservancy, giving \$2550 to the Colorado Fourteener Conservancy for equipment, supplies and in-kind contributions for a total of \$2550 for a project on Mount Massive to stabilize the soil. The project is user-friendly and environmentally sound. The Colorado Fourteener Conservancy is a group of people that has benefited from the wonderful work they do.

A second grant of \$3000 will be given to the Colorado Fourteener Conservancy for tools, as well as for project supplies.

# Colorado Wilderness Network Restoration Project

Join the Colorado Environmental Coalition and the CMC on May 4-6 at Black Mountain/Windy Gulch to help restore an ATV route. These two contiguous roadless areas are geographically distinctive, with high ridge tops and steep, rugged valley walls in immediate proximity to the White River. Predominant vegetation includes Douglas firs as well as dense stands of pinion-juniper woodlands, sagebrush and oak brush. Both areas provide essential wildlife habitat for mule deer, mountain lions and raptors.
